


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

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Fall – Freshmen/Sophomores

- Plan for the Year Ahead All years......Maintain good grades. Most colleges expect a "C" or better (i.e. "D" is not considered a passing grade by colleges). Get help when needed. Be proactive...seek teacher help, after school tutoring @ SRVHS, peer tutoring through CSF, etc. Do this ALL 4 Years! Freshmen: While our CA public schools (CSU and UC) do not use the grades from freshman year in their GPA calculation for admission eligibility (except for Cal Poly SLO), they DO look at the grades in the application process. Sophomores: Grades from sophomore year courses are used in GPA calculation for college admission.
- Using the form in the SRVUSD Course Catalog, prepare a preliminary 4 year plan. Use this plan to guide you as you select your high school courses to ensure you are meeting the requirements for the colleges where you plan to apply.
- Stop by the College and Career Center to get familiar with its resources. Find out the required courses and tests of colleges that you might be interested in attending. Sophomores: Log onto Naviance Family Connection to take assessments, and research colleges and careers. Freshmen will be introduced to Naviance Family Connection and the SRVHS Career Center update sophomores in spring of sophomore year.
- If you've completed Geometry, consider Taking the PSAT/NMSQT for practice (in sophomore year). Sign up for the PSAT/NMSQT at SRVHS in mid-October. Go to www.collegeboard.org to access free on line practice for the PSAT. Keep in mind this is intended to be a test given to juniors, so is just practice for sophomores. (Only juniors can qualify for the National Merit Scholarship competition).
- > Attend SRVHS campus club fair. Join a club! Find ways to volunteer! Get involved in campus activities.
- Start a COLLEGE INFO FILE to keep important information regarding college applications (i.e. this checklist, volunteer log, personal resume—see sample in Naviance Family Connection. Be sure to list of awards/honors, job history, test scores, etc. Save your information in Naviance Family Connection to access it when you need to create a resume or complete a college application.
- Create an e-mail that contains your name (no nicknames) to use for college application process. Most colleges maintain contact with prospective students via e-mail. Plan to keep this e-mail for all 4 years of high school and check it regularly. Use it for your Naviance user name and password!
- Plan to go to college fairs and begin to learn about colleges and the college admissions process (fall=SRVUSD College fair; spring=East Bay College Connection @ St. Mary's in Moraga and in San Francisco (great resource for international schools). Watch school loop & e-Bulletin for announcements of scheduled dates.
- Pay attention to school e-mails, the Daily e-Bulletin, School loop and the SRVHS website for important information, events, dates and deadlines.
